Report of the Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees presents its report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 July 2016. This report is prepared in accordance with the accounting polices set out in note 1 to the financial statements. They also comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing the financial statements in accordance with FRS 102 applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

Structure, Governance and Management

Aberdeen University Students' Association ("the Association") is governed by a Constitution and managed by the Board of Trustees ("the Board"), consisting of matriculated students of the University of Aberdeen who have not opted out of membership under the terms of the Education Act 1994.

The Board consists of not more than 5 Sabbatical Trustees, 4 Student Trustees, 1 University appointed Trustee and 3 External Trustees. At present, there are some vacancies which the Board are hoping to fill in the near future.

The Board is responsible for ratifying Association policy passed by Student Council.

Standing Committees meet as required, their remit being to deal with the business affecting their Standing Committee and to make decisions and policy regarding their business. Standing Committees report their activities to the Board and the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee is made up of Trustees and is responsible for the implementation of all Association policies and decisions, and is accountable to the Board.

The Trustees of the Association who also act as remunerated full-time Student Officers of the Association are elected annually by cross-campus ballot; the other Student Trustee and External Trustee positions are appointed under the terms and conditions laid out within the Association's Constitution.

The Sabbatical Officers receive a month long hand over and training period prior to their start date as Trustees. Training covers all aspects of running the Association and includes the opportunity to attend specific National Union of Students training courses. The non-sabbatical officers attend Executive Committee training sessions as appropriate. The training includes roles, responsibilities of trustees, finance, governance and Health and Safety.

A range of operational issues are delegated to staff. Trustees and staff are involved in developing strategic plans and action plans.

Full details of the constitutional arrangements are set out in the Constitution of the Association. This is available on the Association's web page.

Key Management Personnel

The Board consider the Chief Executive Officer and the Finance Officer to be the key management personnel of the charity, in charge of directing and controlling the charity and running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. The pay of the Chief Executive Officer is reviewed annually and is in line with the average earnings of student association chief executives.

Related Parties

The Association is financially and materially supported by the University of Aberdeen receiving £805,000 (2015 - £880,000) in the year ended 31 July 2016 from the Disbursement Fund. In addition, the Association occupied University premises at Johnston Hall on a rent-free basis.

The Association works closely with the University of Aberdeen in the furtherance of its purposes.

Risk Management

The Association has endeavoured to minimise risk through appropriate training for Trustees and staff, implementation of appropriate policies, for example Health and Safety Policies and financial procedures. The Board of Trustees has produced as risk register which has been included in summarised form as follows:

Objectives and Activities

The purposes of the Aberdeen University Students' Association as set out in its Constitution are:

- the prevention and relief of poverty of students;
- the advancement of citizenship and community development;
- the advancement of education:
- the advancement of the arts, heritage, culture and science;
- the advancement of health among students:
- the organisation of recreational activities for students who have need of them by reason of financial hardship or other disadvantage;
- the organisation of religious and racial harmony;
- the organisation of equality and diversity;
- the organisation of charitable fundraising activities.

In pursuance of its purposes, the Association shall:

- provide welfare, advice and employment services for students;
- provide a recognised means of communication between students and the Court of the University and other relevant local and national bodies;
- promote volunteering activities, with volunteers being involved with the Association itself and the wider community;
- provide training and student support services;
- provide facilities and support for clubs and societies for the advancement of arts, heritage, culture
- provide facilities, support for sports clubs and physical activities and promote general health issues
- promote equality of opportunity among students and challenge all forms of discrimination whether based on sex, age, race, ethnicity, sexuality, disability, religion, cultural background or other such
- carry on any other activities which may be advantageously carried on in connection with and which further any of its purposes.

Report of the Board of Trustees (continued)

Achievements and Performance

2015/16 saw a challenging and somewhat troubled year for the Association, with significant change happening across the organisation.

1. Finance & Governance

During the year, an internal review process revealed some financial irregularities. Following an investigation, an evidence file was passed to the police regarding £42,000 of unaccounted expenses; the case is currently awaiting consideration by the Procurator Fiscal.

Following a brief period of support from the Strategic Support Unit of the National Union of Students, an Interim Chief Executive Office ("CEO") was appointed by the Board for a period of 6 months in order to provide some stability and direction in a number of key areas, including a full review of financial procedures and reporting structures, a review of staffing structures and recruitment of new staff positions, including a permanent CEO.

The review of the staff structure focused on providing the appropriate staff cover in key areas of development required to support the new governance structure produced by a Constitutional Review, which was passed by the student body and the Board. This resulted in the reduction in the number of managers within the Association, a new Representative Services department, and the departure of a number of staff via a voluntary severance process. The one-off costs associated with this process in terms of settlement agreement costs and payments in lieu of notice, amounted to £85,374.

As part of the Constitutional review undertaken during the year, which resulted in a reduction in the numbers of full-time student officers employed by the Association from 7 to 5 and changes to internal governance processes, the compilation of the Board was also reviewed, with one of the External Trustee roles being given over specifically to a University-appointed Trustee in order to give the University improved oversight of the Association's internal governance whilst ensuring that there was no conflict of interest between the two organisations

2. Building Redevelopment

Whilst 2014/15 saw the approval of significant investment in the redevelopment of the Butchart Building, external pressures resulted in the University reviewing its capital development plan, and this redevelopment was placed on hold. With AUSA having moved to a temporary location in August 2015, this put significant pressure on membership engagement levels, and the officer team spent a significant amount of time and energy in exploring short-, medium- and long-term options with the University. As a result, a decision was made in July 2016 to relocate the Association to The Hub, a more central building on campus with a much higher student footfall, which would allow for student engagement levels to be rebuilt and maintained whilst a final decision and timescale for the Butchart redevelopment was made.

Report of the Board of Trustees (continued)

3. Activity & Awards

2015/16 saw the Association's Raising And Giving (RAG) campaign distribute £120,000 of funds to local charities.

In recognition of the work conducted by the student officer team under such difficult circumstances during the first few months of their time in elected office, the Association was awarded the NUS Scotland HE Officer Team of the Year for 2015/16 at the NUS Scotland Conference in April.

The Association undertakes an Annual Review of the Strategic Plan detailing performance against aims and objectives, this is available on the Association's web site.

Financial Report

The total income for the year ended 31 July 2016 was £1,587,942 of which £805,015 was received from the University of Aberdeen from the Disbursement fund. During the year the Association secured funding of £219,983 for specific projects and a further £160,000 from Aberdeen Sports Village, via University of Aberdeen. Donations in kind, from the University of Aberdeen also amounted to £59,600.

A deficit of £92,941 was recorded for the year ended 31 July 2016, compared to a surplus of £8,747 for the year ended 31 July 2015.

Details of restricted funds are set out at note 15 to the accounts. The funds relate to:

- funding of the Education Development Officer, the Resident Community Development Coordinator and Climate Challenge staffing costs;
- disbursement towards the use of Aberdeen Sports Village;
- donations to support the operations of Nightline, Aberdeen Student Radio, Granite City TV and The Gaudie;
- donations to support Sports Clubs and Societies;
- accumulated funds of Bookends which are applied to charitable purposes;
- a grant from the Scottish Government in relation to the Climate Challenge project;
- donations to specific student-led projects in receipt of funds from Aberdeen University's Development Fund

Further information on the nature of these funds are set out on page 23.

Reserves Policy

The Association's reserves policy aims to ensure that sufficient reserves are in place to guarantee its long term sustainability and to provide funds to enable the Association to improve its services and facilities. The minimum level of reserves held at any one time shall be enough to ensure the Association is able to provide the appropriate services for three months, should they get into financial difficulties, and currently stands at £150,000. At the year end, the required level of reserves is not being held. The Board is aware that there is a shortfall and are taking action to correct this.

Report of the Board of Trustees (continued)

Funds Held as Custodian Trustee on Behalf of Others

The Association holds funds on behalf of the Aberdeen University Debater. At 31 July 2016, the balance of these monies was £3,777 (2015 - £4,011) to be used as directed by Debater. These monies are accounted for through the Association's accounting package and held in the Associations bank account.

The Association also holds funds on behalf of the Aberdeen Student's Charities Campaign. At 31 July 2016, the balance of these monies was £8,687 (2015 - £7,482) to be used as directed by the Charities Campaign. These monies are accounted for through the Association's accounting package and are held in the Associations bank account.

Future Plans

Following a period of major internal review within the Association during 2015/16, the Association enters an exciting time in our continuing development.

Following a full and robust review of the constitution, from 1 July 2016, the Association will be governed via a new democratic structure. At its core, this structure is designed to provide our membership with a decision-making process that is fit for purpose in a modern, forward-thinking Association. Alongside this, the new structure sees a reduction in the number of paid Sabbatical officers from 7 to 5, allowing our financial resources to be targeted where they are needed most.

Aligned to the new constitution, the Association has reviewed its staff provision to ensure that the new democratic structures are supported in as effective and efficient a way as possible, and ensuring that the key principles of student-led decision-making within a supportive environment continues to be achieved in as sustainable a manner as possible.

These reviews are supported by a new financial reporting structure, ensuring that improved levels of financial information is available to the Board, managers and other decision-makers as clearly and timeously as possible; and a robust set of HR policies in order to underpin the highest levels of staff performance.

Provision of Information to Auditor

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the Association's auditor is unaware and we have taken all the necessary steps that we ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make ourselves aware of all relevant audit information and to establish that the Association's auditor is aware of that information.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Association and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

We have audited the financial statements of Aberdeen University Students' Association for the year ended 31 July 2016 which comprise the income and expenditure account, balance sheet, statement of cash flows, statement of financial activities and the related notes. Notes to the financial statements

1 Principle accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Aberdeen University Students' Association meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the association. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

Reconciliation with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. No restatement of comparatives is required. The transition date was 1 August 2014.

Going concern

These accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis as the Trustees are satisfied that the financial needs of the Association will be met from within its existing facilities and agreements. If the Association was unable to continue in operation, adjustments would have to be made to reduce the value of the assets to their recoverable amount, to provide for any further liabilities that might arise and to reclassify fixed assets as current assets.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided on all tangible assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight line basis over its useful life as follows:

Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Board in furtherance of the general objectives of the Association. Restricted funds represent monies which have been received for specific purpose.

Notes to the financial statements (continued)

1 Principle accounting policies (continued)

Income recognition

All income is accounted for on an accruals basis. Income is recognised when the Association is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Voluntary income including donation, grants and gifts that provide core funding are of general nature and are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when:

- the donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- the donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Interest on bank deposits is credited in the year in which they are received.

Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure, it is probable that a settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the provision of the Association's facilities
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with the constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated on a basis with the use of resources.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on an appropriate basis.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is included under the cost heading to which it relates.

The Association has been granted charitable status by HMRC and is therefore not liable to taxation.

Pensions

A defined benefit scheme is operated by the University of Aberdeen on behalf of the Association for the benefit of some of its employees. The scheme is a multiemployer pension scheme and it is not possible to identify the assets and liabilities of the scheme which are attributable to the Association. In accordance with FRS102 therefore, the scheme is accounted for as a defined contribution scheme. Contributions payable are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period they are payable.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Aberdeen Future Fund Grant AUSA Performance Space relates to funding received to developing the AUSA Performance Space in Butchart.

18 Related parties

The Association is a semi-autonomous organisation within the University of Aberdeen. The property of the Association shall be vested in the University Court.

The Association is financially and materially supported by the University of Aberdeen, receiving a total of £805,015 in the year to 31 July 2016 (2015 - £880,000) from the Disbursement Fund and £160,000 from Aberdeen Sports Village (2015 - £166,519).

In addition the Association occupies premises at Butchart Recreation Centre and Balgownie Playing Fields on a rent-free basis from the University of Aberdeen. The Association has estimated that the value of this donation in kind amounts to £50,000 for rent and £9,600 for utilities.

The University of Aberdeen charge the Association for the cost of processing the payroll and also pay the wages and salary costs on behalf of the Association, and are then reimbursed for the cost. The charge raised by the University of Aberdeen for processing the payroll throughout the year amounted to £8,940. The amount payable to the University of Aberdeen, at 31 July 2016, for this service and for the salary costs amounted to £109,676 (2015 - £115,013). There was also a balance outstanding for vehicle leasing costs of £3,508.

At 31 July 2016 the Association held a balance of £3,777 (2015 - £4,011) for Aberdeen University Debater (Scottish Charity Number SC030962). This balance is included within Other Creditors.

At 31 July 2016 the Association held a balance of £8,687 (2015 - £7,482) for the Aberdeen Students' Charities Campaign (Scottish Charity Number SC008700). This balance is included within Other Creditors.

22 Pension

University of Aberdeen Superannuation and Life Assurance Pension Scheme

Aberdeen University Students' Association participates in the University of Aberdeen Superannuation and Life Assurance Pension Scheme (UASLAS) which is a funded defined benefit scheme which is open to new members and accruals. There are 9 people participating in the scheme at 31 July 2016.

Under the UASLAS pension fund the contribution rate required for Aberdeen University Students' Association is set on a group basis, combining the experience of the employer with other employers within the same group also participating in the Fund. Within this group assets and liabilities of the Fund are not separately identified between the various employers participating as part of the triennial actuarial valuations. As a result Aberdeen University Students' Association is unable to identify its relevant share of the underlying assets and liabilities in the Fund. These accounts have therefore been drawn up in accordance with FRS102 on the basis that the pension cost is accounted for as for a defined contribution scheme.

Information about the overall funding position of the UASLAS was provided by the actuary in his report dated 31 July 2014. The contributions payable by the employers are based on the position of the Fund as a whole, which is reassessed at each triennial valuation.

During the year, contributions to this scheme amounted to £32,020 (2015 - £39,345).
