Motion: The use of content warnings

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Council notes:

- 1. That recently there were multiple instances where University failed to provide content warnings in their communications.
- 2. That certain disciplines talk about difficult subjects without any pre-caution and safety net.
- 3. That some Schools use such content warnings to reduce the harm to students, and that content warnings are currently featured on some of the University website pages.
- 4. That University of Glasgow provides their staff with 'Content Advice Guidelines'.<sup>1</sup>

Council believes:

- 1. That the introduction of content warnings would serve to self-guard students from reading and hearing about subjects that may cause harm to them.
- 2. That using content warnings is a good practice.

Council resolves:

- 1. To lobby university to provide content warnings on all subjects that may cause harm to students in lecture materials, reading lists, seminars and other forms of communication.
- 2. To provide list of available resources every time sensitive topics are discussed and content that requires warning is brought up.
- 3. To mandate AUSA to use such warnings when required in their communication.
- 4. To mandate AUSA to work with the University to implement content warnings in their communications, curricula and academic resources.
